

BRISBANE SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY WELCOMES REV DR SAMUEL GOH

We are delighted to welcome Rev Dr Samuel Goh to **Brisbane School of** Theology as Lecturer in Old Testament for both our English and Chinese programs.

Sam comes to us with many years teaching experience from Singapore Bible College, School of Theology

and speaks English, Mandarin, Indonesian and Cantonese. He completed his PhD, Old Testament Studies at Queens's University of Belfast in 2008. He has also authored six books (two English and four Chinese), along with many journals. In the foreword to Sam's book, The Basics of Hebrew Poetry (2017), Tremper Longman III describes him as "a leading scholar in Old Testament studies."

We caught up with Sam a few days after he arrived to find out a little more about him.

Tell us a bit about yourself and your family.

I was born in Indonesia and moved to Singapore at the age of 27 and am now Singaporean. I am married to Joyce and we have two grown children.

What is your Christian background and experience?

I became a Christian when I was in high school in Indonesia. I studied my Bachelor of

Theology and Master of Divinity at Singapore Bible College and became a pastor at a Bible Presbyterian Church in Singapore for 10 years After arriving here, I heard a bird early in the before commencing teaching at Singapore Bible College in 2003. My wife Joyce has also been on pastoral staff in our home church for the last 12 years.

Why move from Singapore to come to BST?

I felt it was God's leading. Knowing there are 49 Chinese churches here in Brisbane and only one Bible College teaching in Chinese, I felt I could make a difference here and that's what I'm hoping to do.

As a scholar in Old Testament studies, do you have a favourite subject to teach?

I have been teaching The Pentateuch for the last 15 years but my favourite subject to teach and my new love is wisdom literature - the books of Ecclesiastes, Proverbs & Job. I developed for a hobby a, "How to preach the difficult books" workshop and have taught this seminar in both Singapore and Italy.

What are your hobbies/recreational interests? What experiences would you like to have here in Australia?

I enjoy travel, fishing, classic movies and jazz music such as the big band/crooning classics. I would like to see the native wildlife, kangaroos and koalas, here in Australia. morning, I think it was a kookaburra, which was an unusual sound as I'm not used of hearing birds in Singapore!

What can we be praying for as you settle into your new role and a new country?

Please pray that I can be useful here and become familiar with the culture, expectations and language. Pray for me for the next six months without my wife until she moves here. Pray for myself and my family as this is the first time away from my children.

You'll be leading the Israel study tour next year. What can people expect to experience on such a tour?

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This will be my seventh tour to Israel, After visiting Israel, the Bible comes alive! When people visit the places they've read about in the Bible and see things for themselves, they get a renewed love and appreciation for the Bible. I'm very much looking forward to this study tour.

IN 2020

2020 promises to be a big year at BST for other reasons. The college is launching a range of new initiatives. You can find more details on our new website.

We will be offering a threesemester (one semester per year), ACT accredited course taught by Peter Moore to equip people for supervising and mentoring people in ministry.

In partnership with Living Wholeness Institute, we will be offering three multi-level training courses to equip people in caring for people around them. The Wholeness, God-Centred Change and Integrating Faith and Practice (for mental health professionals).

Courses are designed to cater for a range of levels of confidence and skill in supporting others.

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We are also planning to introduce a course in the prevention of and response to child abuse in Christian communities. We hope this will enable churches, mission agencies and other Christian organisations to make a more informed and effective response to this urgent issue.

of prayer - every meeting began with prayer, and before every event the team involved prayed together. It was encouraging to see how the focus was kept on God.

The week included being involved in a number of areas that weren't my strengths, such as being interviewed in front of a group of people more than once,

Despite my nervousness about leaving my comfort zone, almost none of that nervousness followed me into the week. God gave me so much peace that I felt

prepared to do many things that would usually scare me, and that I never thought I would do. It was because of God's strength that I was able to experience so much, which also led to much personal and Another great part of the week was serving together with spiritual growth and made the week a rewarding and memorable experience.



BST GRADUATES

ANITA CROWN-CLASS OF 2017

Anita Crown graduated from BST in 2017 with an Advanced Diploma of Ministry. Shortly afterwards, she left for Thailand to work as a missionary with OMF. Anita shares with us her experience over the last six months.

Six months ago, after finishing my first year of Language studies, I joined the urban poor church planting team in Bangkok (called 'Rak Chumchon'). Our team consists of both foreign missionaries and Thai workers. "Rak Chumchon" translates "Love the people in the neighborhood". And that is what our team in partnership with Bangkok churches is doing here. Loving people in the urban poor communities by visiting them, supporting them, bringing the Gospel, providing activities for the kids and meeting with interested people to learn together from God's word.

Every week our team visits slums and urban poor communities in the Don Muang area of Bangkok. They vary in terms of level of poverty and issues and so how we serve the people in these neighbourhoods also varies. From Kids Club in a community centre to visiting homes and chatting with folk, praying for them, sharing the gospel and providing practical assistance.

While I've been studying Thai now for 18 months and can communicate and contribute to conversations. I'm far from being able to share the gospel in a clear and effective way. This can be discouraging and even frustrating at times when you want to be able to connect and share with people in this wav.

In one of the slums we visit, there isn't much space to do activities for the kids so we bring the kids to the home of another family who we have been visiting regularly. We provide activities for the kids including a story from the Bible, craft and games. In

this family, Grandma is the main caregiver as Mum is out of the picture and Dad is not a stable part of their lives. This situation is not uncommon in the communities we visit. Working and taking care of the kids has put

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Grandma who was recently hospitalised with high blood pressure. Because of the relationship we had built with her we were able to visit her in hospital and pray with her.

Our next visit to this family, it was just myself and my Thai teammate visiting. I was prepared with lots of activities for the kids who were happily occupied. This gave my Thai co-worker an opportunity to share encouragements from God's word with Grandma and answer any questions she had. He sensed an increased openness from her as they shared. Praise God.

I learnt a lot that evening. My desire is to see Thai people in urban poor communities transformed by the gospel. That afternoon my Thai teammate did what I couldn't do. My contribution at this early stage in ministry can feel so small. But what a privilege to play whatever role I can in support and encouragement of local Thai Christians to faithfully take the gospel to their own people.



Pray for our team of missionaries and Thais as we work together to bring the gospel to the community. Pray for the Thai church in Bangkok to have a growing vision to reach the urban poor communities. And pray for me as a new missionary as I live in an urban poor context and adapt to a new language and culture to serve faithfully and with humility, the people God places in my path.

MILLENNIALS

AND THE FUTURE ASIAN CHURCH

then the future of

the church lies in

In his provocative book, *The Future is Asian* (2019), Parag Khanna argues that while the nineteenth century could be characterised as the 'European' century, and the twentieth century the 'American' century, the twenty first century will be shown to have been the 'Asian' century.

He notes that Asia represents half of the world's GDP, has several of the world's largest

economies, more than half of the world's population, many of the largest banks and technology companies, and, the majority of the world's megacities. What Khanna could have added is that not only is the future Asian politically and economically, but also in regards Christianity. In the past 100 years, the

percentage of Christians in Europe has more than halved, dropping from 66% to 26%, while the number in Asia-Pacific has almost tripled from 4.5% to 13%.

If the future is increasingly Asian, then the future of the church lies in the hands of Asian millennials – those currently aged in their 20's and 30's– as they are the future leaders,

decision-makers and financial supporters of the Asian Church. Let me share some brief thoughts from what I gleaned from Asian millennials themselves while in Singapore in August on what they are like and what are they looking for in a church.

Millennials are the first generation that has grown up with technology and the internet. They are EPIC (experiential, participatory,

image-rich, connected).
They tend to look for instant gratification and don't like to wait (so order in food rather than cook; use Spotify rather than wait for a particular song on the radio). Compared to their parent's, millennials are more ambitious, experiential, and have a greater risk appetite. They don't like being told what to do.

Rather, they want to be told the goal/ destination and they will work out how to get there.
